

## Colorado Voter Registration and Ideology More Unaffiliated/More Liberal







"It's an important vote," said Floyd Ciruli, a pollster and political analyst. "The approved measures were likely to prompt state legislators and Mr. Hickenlooper to consider tightening regulation of the shale gas industry, in part to blunt future efforts by antifracking groups to expand bans or moratoriums. 

Pew Research and other credible national polls show broad support at or above 60 percent, including a majority of Democrats, based on a lack of evidence of a greenhouse gas effect, the desire for energy independence, and the project's potential to boost the economy. 

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# **Snapshots**

- Pot second thoughts, but no repeal (51% worry about "Stoner State" image)
- Guns and gun rights high profile, sensitive issue, Democrats on defensive
- No new taxes statewide, 65% say no to \$1 billion for schools
- Gender and generation splits making electorate more liberal. Hispanic percentage grows.
- Independents now largest bloc of voters, adding volatility
- Colorado supports immigration reform and Keystone Pipeline
- Washington polarization coming to Colorado, hurts Hickenlooper, Udall
  - Colorado could gain a congressional seat in 2020
