Elaine Chick – Water Information Program Update – April 13, 2023

WIP Partner Contributions - I have been following up with the WIP partners who have not submitted their contributions as of yet. As I mentioned in my last report in January, we asked a majority of WIP partners if they would consider increasing their contribution between 10% – 15%. So far, we have eight partners who have increased their contribution this year (one doubled it). I am still waiting for nine partner entities to send in their contributions.

SWCD

 SWCD Annual Water Seminar – I am happy to say that the SWCD Water Seminar was a success. We had 211 paid attendees, 14 - Ft. Lewis students that we provided complementary tickets to, 22 presenters, 3 media, and 16 board members and guests, for a total of 266 people in attendance.

We had great feed back from the audience evaluation forms. Of the 77 survey respondents,100% found the 2023 Annual Water Seminar useful or very useful. Someone wrote "It was great to see the diversity of panel topics and the high caliber of people who presented." We also received good feedback on other questions that were asked on the evaluations to take into consideration for the next seminar. We had positive feedback from the presenters as well.

We did get some negative feedback from the audience regarding Lauren Boebert speaking at the seminar.

The Sky Ute Casino Event Center staff were great to work with. The venue had much better technical equipment to work with and the size of the venue will allow SWCD to continue to grow the audience with lots of space. There are a couple of tweaks that I will implement into the next seminar regarding technical equipment.

• Children's Water Festival 2023 – The Children's Water Festival is taking place May 10th at Ft. Lewis College. I have had a great response from schools and class registration. We have 18 schools, 36 classes and 700 students registered for the 2023 festival. As we have not presented the Water Festival in three years, I am happy with the response. There is definitely a reduction in teachers and student attendance at many schools in various districts. I am still needing a few more presenters and volunteers. I will be working on scheduling all of the classes and presenters and creating a custom itinerary for each class. The challenge in scheduling is, every school arrives at a different time and departs at different times. The water festival will be my focus over the next month and a half.

The following is a summary of the topics Carrie Padgett worked on for SWCD since the last Board meeting, during the months of February and March in 2023. For more background and detail please contact me.

San Juan and Upper Basin Endangered Fish Recovery Programs

I participated in multiple committee meetings in committee meetings in February and March, including an in-person series of Biology Committee meetings the week of February 20. The winter meetings focus on 2022 project reports and discussion of future projects. The 2022 project reports continue to show a positive trend in capture rates for Colorado pikeminnow and razorback suckers. In exciting news, age-0 Colorado pikeminnow were captured. Since the committee stopped stocking age-0 fish, these captures indicate wild recruitment and spawning. When discussing fish recruitment bottlenecks (i.e., fish maturing to adulthood and spawning), the need for more habitat dominated the discussion. The committee brainstormed increasing habitat through wetlands, off-channel ponds, or by other efforts (i.e., manmade structures in the river).

At the meeting and in subsequent weeks following the meeting, the committee has discussed the potential for a spring peak release. While the flow recommendations decision tree does not prescribe a release based on the current forecast and available water supply, the committee believes a shorter duration spring peak release could help facilitate movement of sediment downstream while capitalizing on the relatively high predicted runoff for the Animas River. The Animas River provides a significant contribution to the San Juan River, enabling it to meet many of the flow targets that would not otherwise be met by releases from Navajo Reservoir. The decision to make this release will be made by April 11.

The next Biology Committee and Coordination Committee meetings will be held on May and 10. The annual meeting of the Program will be the morning of May 10 at the Public Library in Durango.

In years past, the Programs' participants would be conducting their annual congressional briefings this month with representatives and staff from the four states. These briefings are critical in maintaining congressional support for the programs and fostering working relationships with representatives and staff. This year's briefings have been postponed until after authorizing

legislation for post 2023 programs is introduced. This process will be carried out by Colorado Department of Natural Resources and Senator Hickenlooper's office.

To help support this process, Tom Pitts has asked Programs' participants to provide letters of support for appropriations to the Bureau of Reclamation for the two programs. I have attached two draft letters, one to the House Energy and Water Appropriations Subcommittee and one to the Senate Energy and Water Appropriations Subcommittee. These letters were drafted to comply with witness testimony format requirements for the subcommittees. The deadlines for submittal of the letters are April 17 and April 21.

Navajo Reservoir

The next Navajo Reservoir Operations meeting will be held on April 18. The Biology Committee is currently voting on if their will be a spring peak release due to the above average snow back in the Animas River basin. This meeting will also provide water users the forecasted inflow into Navajo and proposed reservoir operations for the remainder of the water year.

Animas Watershed Partnership (AWP)

On March 28 I attended an Animas River stream management planning meeting. The group of stakeholders discussed the draft goals and outcomes for scoping a stream management plan. The first half of the discussion centered around intended outcomes of the process, such as technical assessments, project priorities, public outreach plan, and a committee structure needed to implement projects. The second half of the discussion overarching goal categories for the plan. These categories include recreation, ecology, regulatory, infrastructure, agriculture (and other water uses), and education. The next meeting will be in late April with a focus on building the scope of work for the planning process and future grant applications.

06CW127 Case

I continue to provide technical support for this conditional water right. In recent months, I've reviewed proposed Notice of Intent forms and provide comments to Steve and the applicant.

Instream Flow Assistance

For this Board meeting, I reviewed the proposed instream flow appropriations for 2023 and 2024. The March 10, 2023 public notice from CWCB identifies streams and lakes that may be considered for appropriations in 2024. Goat Creek, in Division 4, was listed in the recommendations table. No other reaches were recommended within SWCD's boundaries.

Goat Creek was first recommended in 2021. As you may recall, BLM proposed protections from the headwaters of Goat Creek to the confluence with Beaver Creek. The Gurley Ditch intercepts the creek about 3.5 miles downstream from the headwaters. Steve and I meet with Rob Viehl to raise our concerns about the proposed reach along Goat Creek and how this could impact existing water users. Since our meeting with CWCB, the proposed reach length has been updated and will now begin below the Gurley Ditch to the confluence with Beaver Creek. While the reach length has been updated on CWCB's website (see map viewer), the recommendation letter from BLM has not been updated.

At the January 2023 CWCB board meeting they declared their intent to appropriate instream flow water rights on twelve streams. Within SWCD's boundaries, ISFs on Kelly Creek and Red Canyon Creek are proposed. Below is a summary of the water rights. These two reaches were first recommended in 2022, along with one other reach in the same watershed. Big A Creek reach is no longer listed as an active candidate on their website. When these two reaches were first proposed, we reviewed them and found no concerns.

We welcome feedback from the board and are excited to continue to work toward our Strategic Plan.

Southwestern Water Conservation District

2023 Draft Action Plan

Proposed to the SWCD Board on April 13th, 2023

SP #1: In coordination with the appropriate partners, ensure SWCD remains engaged in obtaining, updating, and analyzing water supply, demand, and quality data necessary to address the water management challenges facing southwest Colorado.

- 1. Continue work with Wright Water Engineers in the verification of Hydros Risk Study to assess current water supply and demand conditions at a subbasin scale within the San Juan and Dolores River Basins, and assess future scenarios.
- 2. Continue to evaluate the SWCD stream-gaging funding program, including identifying additional local, state, and federal partners to support current efforts.
- 3. Support the Colorado Airborne Snow Measure (CASM) working group by helping to apply for and administer grant opportunities.

SP #2: Lead advocacy for southwest Colorado in Colorado River, interstate, and trans mountain issues.

- SWCD staff will stay engaged in Colorado River interstate discussions. This includes within Colorado (Colorado Water Conservation Board and Colorado River District), Upper Division States (via Upper Colorado River Commission), and the seven basin states as appropriate. (Ongoing)
- 2. Monthly review of water court resumes (Divisions 3, 4 & 7) to identify water applications that need further evaluation and possible action by SWCD. *(Ongoing)*
- 3. Support efforts to reauthorize the Upper Colorado River and San Juan River Endangered Species Recovery Implementation Programs (RIPs).

SP #3: Balance meeting multiple water needs amongst a diverse set of priorities, especially when there is potential for conflict or mutual benefit.

- 1. Continue to monitor water planning issues within San Miguel and Montrose Counties.
- 2. Seek discussions and joint meetings between the SWCD Board and representatives of the Southern Ute tribe.
- 3. Seek discussions and joint meetings between the SWCD Board and representatives of the Ute Mountain Ute tribe.
- 4. SWCD Staff to continue to participate in Animas River Working Group.
- 5. Work with other Southwest entities to identify existing infrastructure that needs improvements to run more efficiently.

SP #4: Support investment in improvements to existing and development of new infrastructure for multiple uses in southwest Colorado.

- 1. Continue to support efforts by Redmesa Ditch & Reservoir Co. to rehabilitate Redmesa Dam.
- 2. Stay involved in forest health discussions by supporting the authorization of the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018 (commonly known as the Farm Bill).

SP #5: Strengthen the continued professional and efficient operation of SWCD while building a culture of mutual trust and respect.

- 1. For the 2024 budget, SWCD will continue to work to align the priorities identified in the strategic plan and the allocation of funds in its budget.
- 2. SWCD staff in conjunction with General Counsel will work to ensure we have proper contracts in place for all consultants and related work efforts. (Ongoing)
- 3. Prepare a draft job description for one additional SWCD staff for Board review. Seek to hire by mid-2023.
- 4. The SWCD board will consider the adoption of an SWCD Director Responsibilities and Board Code of Conduct.
- 5. SWCD staff will review all district policies and determine what needs to be updated.

SP #6: Cultivate SWCD credibility with decision-makers and the public through targeted outreach efforts.

- 1. With support and coordination from the Board, SWCD staff shall continually seek opportunities to interact with and maintain good working relationships with elected officials at the local, state, and federal levels as well as with District water users and constituent groups, including water conservancy districts, the Southwest Basin Roundtable, and county commissioners. (*Ongoing*)
- 2. SWCD Board and staff will develop an "elevator speech" and tagline that adequately summarizes SWCD's work.
- 3. SWCD staff and consultants will host the 39th annual Southwest Water Seminar and partner on the 4th annual "Water Connections" educational event with Four Corners Water Center at Fort Lewis College and SGM Consulting. *(Seminar held on March 31st; Water Connections date tbd)*
- 4. SWCD staff, with board direction, will begin disseminating a regular e-newsletter to increase SWCD visibility. (Monthly newsletter is ongoing; continue to look for ways to improve)
- 5. Develop multi-year strategy for compiling SWCD history to present to the Board in late 2022.
- 6. SWCD Staff to attend at least two annual water days hosted throughout the basin, rotating counties when possible either setting up informational table, or speaking for the event.
- 7. SWCD staff to evaluate social media gaps and areas where SWCD could improve on engaging new audiences, sharing events, and creating a more comprehensive online presence.

20243 GRANT PROGRAM GUIDELINES

A. BACKGROUND

The Southwestern Water Conservation District ("SWCD") is a political subdivision of the State that was established by the Colorado General Assembly in 1941 to protect, conserve, use and develop the water resources of the San Juan and Dolores River Basins as well as to safeguard all waters to which the state of Colorado is equitably entitled.¹ SWCD periodically offers financial assistance in the form of grants to "qualified entities," as that term is defined below in Section C.1, that are carrying out projects consistent with SWCD's statutory purposes. Funding for this program is subject to SWCD's discretion as well as its annual budget and appropriation process. The Board retains the right, in its sole discretion, to approve, reduce, or deny any grant request.

Prior to applying, please ensure you as the Applicant can answer "yes" to each of the following questions:

- ✓ Are you a qualified entity (see page 3)?
- ☑ Are you located within the District boundaries (see page 3)?
- ✓ Is the project anticipated to start and finish in 2023 (see page 3)?
- Are you providing cash or in-kind match of at least 25% of the total project cost (page 4)?
- ☑ Is the SWCD grant request for less than 50% of the total project cost (page 4)?
- ☑ Have you spoken with SWCD staff (Mo RockLaura Spann, 970-247-1302) about the project and grant application prior to submission?

B. GENERAL PROGRAM INFORMATION

For the 20243 grant program, applications may be submitted from October 1st through November 3rd, 2024. November 1st through December 9th of 2022. Applicants are encouraged to submit their application as early as possible within the given time frame so that there is adequate time to work with SWCD staff to ensure that the application meets all requirements in advance of the November 3rd December 9th deadline. Funding for emergency situations may be considered by the board as they occur. Applications received after November 3rd 2023 December

9, 2022 will not be considered. Final decisions will be made by the board no later than January 31st 2024. NEW DATE March 1, 2023.

The deadlines provided above apply to routine grant requests and may be modified to address emergency situations. SWCD understands that emergency situations may arise from catastrophic or unforeseen events, such as flooding, at other times of the year. The Board endeavors to annually allocate a portion of the grant program funds for emergency requests. Examples of emergency situations include but are not limited to: flood event causing damage to diversion or measurement structures, catastrophic canal or pipeline failure that prevents the delivery of water, spillway or dam failure, regulatory restrictions, wildfire impacts including post-fire runoff and other impacts, and toxic spills. Please contact SWCD staff directly if this occurs to discuss the possibility of submitting an emergency grant application.

SWCD annually anticipates receiving grant requests well in excess of the available funds. The maximum amount of money potentially available from SWCD in the 20243 calendar year for all grant recipients is listed in the table below.

If, as part of budget development for the upcoming fiscal year, the board adjusts the total grant program funding available, funding allocations by category will be adjusted proportionally or based on Board recommendations. Prior to submitting an application, please <u>visit SWCD's</u> website to read the latest proposed 2024-2023 grant funding available.

Any member of SWCD's Board of Directors or Staff with a financial or property interest in a grant request will disclose any such interest or other conflict of interest and recuse themselves from participating in any recommendation, vote, or decision-making process related to that grant request.

C. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

1. ELIGIBILITY

SWCD will only consider financial assistance requests from "qualified entities" for: (1) development or improvement of water supply and watershed restoration or enhancement projects, including related design, engineering, and construction, (2) studies and facilitating stakeholder involvement inon water-related matters, including water quality, (3) educational purposes, including teaching seminars, workshop, and related programs, and (4) emergency situations.

"Qualified entities" are defined by statute to include any public entity, non-profit corporation, not-for-profit corporation, carrier ditch company, mutual ditch or reservoir company, unincorporated ditch or reservoir company, or cooperative association within the boundaries of the District.² All projects, studies, and program grants will be limited to "raw" or untreated water supplies, except as provided below. Only projects or portions of projects located within the District's boundaries are eligible for grant funding.

SWCD will <u>not</u> consider grant requests or funding for:

- a. Projects that have already been completed; however, the board may make an exception for projects completed within the past six months arising from the emergency situations described on page two of these guidelines;
- b. Municipal or domestic drinking water projects that do not qualify as a "public water system," which is defined for the purposes of these guidelines to mean any system that does not have a public water system ID number with the state of Colorado;
- c. Any part of a municipal or domestic "public water system" which is unrelated to raw water storage or delivery. Applications for eligible portions of the public water system should include the state ID number for the system;
- d. Wastewater treatment projects;
- e. Legal fees or payroll costs. SWCD will not pay an employee's salary or hourly wages but may consider paying for crew or seasonal work as it pertains to the specific project described in the grant proposal. If your project includes salary or hourly wages for employees, these costs, please identify them as a separate line itemline item in the proposed budget and explain how you will pay for those costs without using SWCD grant funds. If you're wanting to apply funding to crew or

seasonal project work please identify this in your application, extra documentation may be required by the Board to approve such requests. Paying for an employee's time will be at the discretion of the board SWCD; we will not pay an employee's salary or hourly wages but may consider paying for crew or seasonal work as it pertains to the project, extra documentation may be required (see Annual Reporting Requirement).

- f. Grant administration costs; or
- g. Weed management projects, although consideration will be given to programs that specifically remove phreatophytes if the Applicant demonstrates it has a plan, including funding, for appropriate revegetation and ongoing maintenance.

2. MATCHING CONTRIBUTIONS

SWCD will not award a grant for more than 50% of the total project costs,³ and Applicants must demonstrate that they are actively contributing to the project for which they are requesting a grant. Any grant approval and releasing of funds will be contingent on the recipient demonstrating that they have prior to disbursement of the grant that the Applicant has secured funding for the remaining total project costs.

In addition, Applicants or beneficiaries of the proposed project must also demonstrate that they will provide, through a cash contribution and/or in-kind goods or services, at least 25% of the total project costs (in other words, half of the matching funds). Applications proposing use of in-kind goods and services as all or a portion of the required matching contribution must provide detailed information identifying time and valuation (at an hourly or total project rate) of in-kind contributions. The Board may, at their discretion option, consider previous expenditures directly related to the proposed project as matching contributions if those expenditures occurred within six months of the grant application deadline.

The Applicant's 25% match cannot be met through a loan from SWCD.

Non-profit, or non-governmental organizations, serving on behalf of a broad group of local constituents that do not receive tax revenues and do not have opportunities for third-partythird party contributions for the project, may request a reduction of the match requirement to 10% of the total project cost (subject to approval by the Board) by garnering and documenting strong community or watershed support for the project.

3. LIMITS ON GRANT FUNDING

The amount of funding each "qualified entity" may receive from SWCD is further limited to the following:

^{3a} For multi-phase projects, "total project costs" shall mean all costs related to the particular phase of the project for which the Applicant is requesting funding.

- a. Recipients of grants for <u>development or improvement of water-related projects</u> may not receive more than \$60,000 in a single year or a total of \$120,000 in any given five (5) year period.
- b. Recipients of grants for <u>participation in public forums and the performance of studies</u> may not receive, more than \$20,000 in any single year or a total of \$40,000 in any given five (5) year period.
- c. Recipients of grants for <u>educational purposes</u> may not receive more than \$15,000 in a single year or a total of \$2±0,000 in any given five (5) year period.

Additional funds, outside of SWCD's grant program, may be available through SWCD's loan program. Please review Section I below or contact SWCD staff to find out more about SWCD's loan program.

4. APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS AND PROCESS

Completion of SWCD's application form is required for SWCD to consider requests for financial assistance. The Board will not consider applications that do not meet the minimum requirements. To ensure consideration for funding by SWCD, please apply for a grant before the water project, study or educational program has been initiated. Please use the following application:

General Application for Financial Assistance 20243

Each application should be typed or printed legibly and include, at a minimum, the following:

- a. Documentation confirming the Applicant is a qualified entity per the definition on page 2 of these guidelines. Examples of proper documentation include (but are not limited to) articles of incorporation, corporate bylaws, or a Certificate of Good Standing from the Colorado Secretary of State;
- b. Project type, description, and location, including the county or counties within which the grant funds will be applied;
- c. Total grant amount requested;
- d. Total project cost⁴;
- e. Anticipated timeline for the project, study or educational request;
- f. Matching contributions provided by or requested from other funding partners, including the anticipated decision date for those funding requests if not already approved;

- g. Detailed project expense budget, including as a percentage of the total and any costs of administering the grant;
- h. Applicant's matching contributions, including a detailed description of in-kind materials and services, if any, to be provided by the Applicant should be included with the basis for in-kind valuations;
- i. Applicant's current <u>financial statements</u>, including a summary of reserves and assessments that demonstrate adequate financial resources for ongoing operation, maintenance, and repair;
- j. Identification of whether, and if so how, the requested grant will aid in the development, use, or protection of pre-compact water rights, along with a "Water Rights Tabulation" report from the Colorado Division of Water Resources;
- k. Identification of project partners and beneficiaries; and
- 1. Summary of Applicant's previous funding requests and grant awards from SWCD.

All applications and supporting documentation must be submitted in a single .pdf file. Applications submitted in multiple files will not be considered.

Please attach additional sheets as necessary to fully answer any question to assure that all information that might be helpful in evaluating your application is considered. Please return the **signed copy** of the application to Southwestern Water Conservation District and retain a copy for your records. Please submit to the following address or email: Southwestern Water Conservation District, 841 E. 2nd Avenue, Durango, CO 81301 *or* **morock@swwcd.orglauras@swwcd.org**. Once your grant application is received, it will be reviewed by SWCD staff to ensure that it meets the minimum requirements before consideration by the Board. Staff will endeavor to share its funding recommendation with the Applicant prior to the meeting.

The Board will hold a meeting in NEW DATE February 2023 to review and consider grant applications at the first Regular Board meeting in 2024, the applications. Applicants are encouraged to attend the meeting at which the funding requests will be considered, either in person or virtually by phone, so that they can provide a brief summary of their grant request and answer questions that may arise. The Board requests a thorough, completed application form be submitted in lieu of a formal presentation.

D. EVALUATION CRITERIA

Grant proposals will be evaluated based onupon how well the proposed project, study, or educational request carries out the purposes of the SWCD. The Board will give special consideration to grant proposals that further the use or protection of pre-compact water rights and the development of Colorado River Compact entitlements as well as educational-related requests that complement or otherwise further SWCD's existing programs.

Furthermore, Applicants must demonstrate adequate shareholder assessments and reserves for ongoing operation, maintenance, and repair of their infrastructure. The Board will give favorable consideration to grant proposals from Applicants that are proactively and financially planning for their own future needs.

E. FUNDS DISBURSEMENT

Once a grant application has been reviewed and approved by the Board, a request for the release of grant funds may be made during 2023. If the Applicant will not be able to use the funds in that year, please contact the SWCD office as soon as possible.

For grant funds to be released, the Applicant must:

- 1. Sign the "Document of Understanding" that accompanies the grant approval letter;
- 2. Complete a "Request for Release of Funds" form found on the website;
- **3.** Provide written documentation that all committed matching funds have been secured; and
- **4.** Provide written documentation that confirms the Applicant continues to be a qualified entity (see examples of appropriate documentation on page 5).

The signature of the Applicant's authorized representative on the "Request for Release of Funds" form indicates that the funds are needed at that time and that the Applicant ensures and verifies that the funds are only being used for the specific purpose(s) described in the application and amount(s) indicated in SWCD's grant approval letter. The Applicant agrees to allow SWCD to display a public notice identifying the project or activity as being partially funded by the SWCD. Additional documentation may be requested at SWCD's discretion prior to the release of funds.

In the event the project, study, or program for which the grant was awarded ultimately comes in under budget, the grant recipient must return a pro-rata portion of the remaining funds to SWCD within 45 days of completion. For example, if the completed project, study, or program is \$20,000 under budget and SWCD contributed 20% of the total anticipated project costs, then the grant recipient must return \$4,000 (20% of \$20,000) to SWCD.

F. CHANGING THE USE OF FUNDS

If the Board approves funding for the application, and at a future date the intended use of funds changes, please notify staff as soon as possible. Board review and approval of the change is necessary. Otherwise, SWCD requires reimbursement of funds.

G. GRANT EXTENSION REQUESTS

If the Board approves funding for the application, and completion of the project, study, program or other grant-funded task has not occurred in 2023, the Applicant must submit a written grant extension request to SWCD Staff describing the progress to date and the projected timeline for completion. At that time, Staff may elect to approve a one-year extension.

Grant extensions are usually limited to one year. However, at its option, the Board may approve grant extensions of more than one year, the Applicant may be required to submit a new application, or if funds have already been disbursed, the Board may request that the funds be returned.

H. ANNUAL REPORTING REQUIREMENT

If the Board approves funding for the application, the Applicant must provide a written report and/or supporting documentation of the work accomplished no later than December 31, 2024NEW DATEDecember 31, 2023. This written report will include a detailed accounting of the use of funds including supporting documentation for any expenses incurred, as well as a detailed outline of total project budget spenteosts. Additional documentation may be requested at the discretion of SWCD. See sample final reports at swwcd.org. If the Applicant cannot submit the final report by the deadline, they must submit a written request for an extension of time to SWCD staff prior to December 31, 20243 that explains the reporting delay and a proposed final submittal date. The Board will not consider future grant requests from Applicants that do not comply with this provision orand submit an unacceptable final report.

I. LOANS

Loans and/or loan-grant packages may be approved for water-related projects or construction, studies, educational programs, and sponsorships. The terms and security for payment will be determined at the time the loan is approved. All documents required by SWCD for the loan shall be executed before SWCD will release the approved loan amount. Documents that SWCD, at its sole discretion, may require include, but may not be limited to, a loan agreement, promissory note, deed of trust for real property, and/or a uniform commercial code financing statement for personal property.

HB23-1281 Advance The Use Of Clean Hydrogen

Short Title: Advance The Use Of Clean Hydrogen

Sponsors: B. Titone (D) | S. Vigil (D)

Summary: Section 2 of the bill defines clean hydrogen (clean hydrogen) as

hydrogen that is:

• Derived from a clean energy resource that uses water as the source of hydrogen; or

• Produced through a process that results in lifecycle greenhouse gas emissions rates that are less than 1.5 kilograms of carbon dioxide equivalent per kilogram of hydrogen, as set forth in applicable federal law.

Section 2 also directs the public utilities commission (commission) to establish a stand-alone application, review, and approval process for investor-owned utility projects that result in the production of clean hydrogen (clean hydrogen project). For a clean hydrogen project to be approved by the commission, an investor-owned utility must submit an application to the commission demonstrating that the clean hydrogen project involves collaboration between the investor-owned utility and a state or federal agency. Any application for a clean hydrogen project must include:

- Best practices utilized by the investor-owned utility to reduce air emissions and environmental impacts, conduct leak detection monitoring, and increase public safety;
- If the investor-owned utility's clean hydrogen production facilities are located in a disproportionately impacted community, a cumulative impact analysis that evaluates past, present, and future impacts; and
- An assessment of the annual volume of water used in electrolysis of water to produce clean hydrogen for the clean hydrogen project.

Section 2 also requires the commission to allow an investor-owned utility to sell clean hydrogen to third parties under a clean hydrogen tariff.

For income tax years commencing on or after January 1, 2024, but before January 1, 2033, **section 3** creates a state income tax credit in specified amounts per kilogram of clean hydrogen used for industrial operations, for operating a heavy-duty vehicle, or for aviation (tax credit). Any taxpayer seeking to claim the tax credit must first apply for and receive a tax credit certificate from the Colorado energy office.

and constructed within a natural stream system for certain restoration purposes (stream restoration project) does not cause material injury to vested water rights (rebuttable presumption). A holder of a vested water

right may challenge the rebuttable presumption by sufficiently

demonstrating in a court of competent jurisdiction that the Capital letters or bold & italic numbers indicate new material to be added to existing law. operation of the stream restoration project has caused material injury to a vested water right. The bill also requires that, at least 63 calendar days before the commencement of a stream restoration project, the owner or proponent of the stream restoration project register the

project with the state engineer and provide notice to the substitute water supply plan notification list (registration and notice requirement). Upon the completion of a stream restoration project, the owner or proponent of the stream restoration project shall file a completion report with the state engineer. If a stream restoration project is limited to certain minor restoration activities:

- * The stream restoration project does not cause material injury to any vested water right;
- * The stream restoration project is not an unnecessary dam or other obstruction; and
- * The owner or proponent of the stream restoration project is not required to comply with the registration and notice requirement. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 1 SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly 2 finds that: 3 (a) Functioning natural streams are beneficial to all Coloradans4 because they provide clean water for farms and cities as well as 5 broad-based public safety and ecological services, including:6 (I) Forest and watershed health; 7 (II) Wildfire mitigation and recovery; 8 (III) Flood safety;9 (IV) Water quality;10 (V) Recreation; and11 (VI) Riparian and aquatic habitats; 12 (b) Functioning natural streams that are connected to floodplains 13 balance the patterns of sediment erosion and deposition, which protects 14 water infrastructure, including diversion structures, ditches, pumps, pipes, 1 and reservoirs, that are susceptible to damage and adverse impacts from 2 sedimentation, especially sedimentation resulting from fires and floods;3 (c) Stream restoration projects are an essential tool for water4 project developers and wastewater and stormwater dischargers to meet5 regulatory obligations;6 (d) Stream restoration projects address the legacy of water quality7 and habitat impacts from abandoned mines or catastrophic mine spills that8 have deprived entire communities of safe drinking water; and 9 (e) The Colorado water plan sets a vision for thriving watersheds 10 and calls for multi-benefit projects that restore stream health to enhance 11 water supply security for agriculture, communities, tourism, and 12 ecosystem function.13 (2) The general assembly therefore declares that, because of the 14 vast amount of benefits that natural streams provide the state's 15 communities and environment, the state should facilitate and encourage 16 the commencement of projects that restore the environmental health of 17 natural stream systems. 18 SECTION 2. "MINOR STREAM RESTORATION ACTIVITY" MEANS ANY OR ALL1 OF THE FOLLOWING ACTIVITIES:2 (A) STABILIZING THE BANKS OR SUBSTRATE OF A NATURAL3 STREAM SYSTEM WITH DEFORMABLE AND POROUS HARD OR4 BIOENGINEERED STRUCTURES COMPOSED OF WOOD, ROCK, OR NATURAL5 MATERIALS THAT RESULT IN ONLY AN INCIDENTAL INCREASE IN SURFACE6 AREA, NOT TO EXCEED THE ORDINARY HIGH WATER MARK OF THE7 NATURAL STREAM;8 (B) MECHANICAL GRADING OF THE GROUND SURFACE ALONG A9 NATURAL STREAM SYSTEM IN A MANNER THAT DOES NOT RESULT IN10 GROUNDWATER EXPOSURE, DIVERSIONS OF SURFACE WATER, OR THE11 COLLECTION OF STORM WATER;12 (C) STABILIZING AN EPHEMERAL OR INTERMITTENT NATURAL13 STREAM BY INSTALLING DEFORMABLE AND POROUS STRUCTURES INTO THE 14 BANKS AND SUBSTRATE, WHICH MAY INCIDENTALLY AND TEMPORARILY15 INCREASE SURFACE AREA OR INFILTRATION;16 (D) DAYLIGHTING A NATURAL STREAM THAT HAS BEEN PIPED OR17 BURIED;18 (E) REDUCING THE SURFACE AREA OF A NATURAL STREAM TO19 ADDRESS REDUCTIONS IN HISTORICAL FLOW AMOUNTS; AND20 (F) INSTALLING STRUCTURES OR RECONSTRUCTING A CHANNEL IN21 A NATURAL STREAM SYSTEM FOR THE SOLE PURPOSE OF RECOVERY FROM22 THE IMPACTS OF A WILDLAND FIRE OR FLOOD EMERGENCY.23 (II) "NATURAL STREAM" HAS THE MEANING SET FORTH IN SECTION24 37-87-102 (1)(b).25 (III) "NATURAL STREAM SYSTEM" MEANS THE EXTENT OF A26 NATURAL STREAM IN THE STATE AND THE GEOMORPHIC FLOODPLAIN AND 27 ASSOCIATED RIPARIAN AREA.1 (IV) "STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT" MEANS A PROJECT THAT IS2 DESIGNED AND CONSTRUCTED:3 (A) WITHIN A NATURAL STREAM SYSTEM;4 (B) FOR THE PURPOSES OF WILDLAND FIRE MITIGATION; FLOOD5 MITIGATION; BANK STABILIZATION; WATER QUALITY PROTECTION OR6 RESTORATION; HABITAT, SPECIES, OR ECOSYSTEM RESTORATION; DROUGHT7 RESILIENCE; SOURCE WATER PROTECTION; INFRASTRUCTURE PROTECTION;8 OR SEDIMENT AND EROSION MANAGEMENT; AND9 (C) IN A MANNER THAT DOES NOT INCREASE THE WATER SURFACE10 AREA OF THE NATURAL STREAM BY MORE THAN ONE-QUARTER ACRE PER11 STRUCTURE OR TREATMENT AND THAT DOES NOT EXCEED A TOTAL 12 INCREASE OF EIGHT SURFACE ACRES FOR A SERIES OF STRUCTURES WITHIN13 ONE STREAM MILE.14 (c) (I) EXCEPT AS SET FORTH IN SUBSECTION (9)(f)(I) OF THIS15 SECTION:16 (A) THERE IS A REBUTTABLE PRESUMPTION THAT A

STREAM17 RESTORATION PROJECT DOES NOT CAUSE MATERIAL INJURY TO VESTED18 WATER RIGHTS: AND19 (B) THE HOLDER OF A VESTED WATER RIGHT MAY CHALLENGE THE 20 REBUTTABLE PRESUMPTION BY BRINGING AN ACTION IN THE WATER COURT21 FOR THE DIVISION IN WHICH THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT IS22 CONDUCTED NO LATER THAN TWO YEARS AFTER THE FILING OF THE23 COMPLETION REPORT REQUIRED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (9)(e) OF THIS24 SECTION.25 (II) THE HOLDER OF A VESTED WATER RIGHT MAY REBUT THE26 REBUTTABLE PRESUMPTION PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (9)(c)(I)(B) OF27 THIS SECTION BY PRESENTING EVIDENCE SUFFICIENT TO SHOW THAT THE 1 OPERATION OF A STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT HAS CAUSED MATERIAL2 INJURY TO THE VESTED WATER RIGHT.3 (d) EXCEPT AS SET FORTH IN SUBSECTION (9)(f)(III) OF THIS4 SECTION, AT LEAST SIXTY-THREE CALENDAR DAYS BEFORE THE5 COMMENCEMENT OF A STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT, THE OWNER OR6 PROPONENT OF THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT SHALL:7 (I) REGISTER THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT WITH THE STATE8 ENGINEER ON A FORM PRESCRIBED BY THE STATE ENGINEER; AND9 (II) PROVIDE NOTICE TO THE SUBSTITUTE WATER SUPPLY PLAN10 NOTIFICATION LIST MAINTAINED BY THE STATE ENGINEER PURSUANT TO11 SECTION 37-92-308 (6) FOR THE WATER DIVISION IN WHICH THE STREAM12 RESTORATION PROJECT IS PROPOSED. THE NOTICE MUST INCLUDE: 13 (A) THE LOCATION OF THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT, 14 INCLUDING THE NAME OF THE STREAM, THE COUNTY WHERE THE STREAM15 RESTORATION PROJECT IS PROPOSED, AND THE APPROXIMATE ELEVATION16 OF THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT;17 (B) CONTACT INFORMATION FOR THE OWNER OR PROPONENT OF 18 THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT; 19 (C) A DESCRIPTION OF ANY PURPOSES OF THE STREAM20 RESTORATION PROJECT, AS DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (9)(b)(IV)(B) OF21 THIS SECTION;22 (D) A PROJECT MAP, DESIGN, AND DESCRIPTION DEMONSTRATING23 THAT THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT IS DESIGNED IN ACCORDANCE24 WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTION (9)(b)(IV) OF THIS SECTION;25 AND26 (E) A SUMMARY OF ANY OUTREACH REGARDING THE STREAM27 RESTORATION PROJECT, INCLUDING NOTIFICATION OF THE STREAM1 RESTORATION PROJECT TO ADJOINING PROPERTY OWNERS, LOCAL FLOOD2 CONTROL DISTRICTS, THE BASIN ROUNDTABLE CREATED IN SECTION3 37-75-104 (1)(a) OF THE WATER BASIN WHERE THE STREAM RESTORATION4 PROJECT IS PROPOSED, OR ANY OTHER POTENTIALLY INTERESTED PERSONS5 WITH INTERESTS IN THE VICINITY OF THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT.6 (e) UPON THE COMPLETION OF A STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT.7 THE OWNER OR PROPONENT OF THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT SHALL8 FILE A COMPLETION REPORT WITH THE STATE ENGINEER IN A FORM9 PRESCRIBED BY THE STATE ENGINEER.10 (f) IF A STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT IS LIMITED TO ONE OR11 MORE MINOR STREAM RESTORATION ACTIVITIES:12 (I) THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT DOES NOT CAUSE13 MATERIAL INJURY TO ANY VESTED WATER RIGHT;14 (II) THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT IS NOT AN UNNECESSARY15 DAM OR OTHER OBSTRUCTION; AND16 (III) THE OWNER OR PROPONENT OF THE STREAM RESTORATION17 PROJECT IS NOT REQUIRED TO COMPLETE THE REGISTRATION AND NOTICE18 REOUIREMENTS DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (9)(d) OF THIS SECTION.19 (g) THE OWNER OR PROPONENT OF A STREAM RESTORATION20 PROJECT SHALL NOT INSTALL THE STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT IN A21 MANNER THAT ADVERSELY AFFECTS THE FUNCTION OF STRUCTURES USED22 TO DIVERT WATER OR MEASURE WATER FLOW BY HOLDERS OF VESTED23 WATER RIGHTS WITHOUT THE PERMISSION OF THE OWNERS OF THE24 STRUCTURES.25 (h) ON OR BEFORE FEBRUARY 1, 2026. THE STATE ENGINEER SHALL26 REPORT THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION TO THE AGRICULTURE AND 27 NATURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE OF THE SENATE AND THE AGRICULTURE, 1 WATER, AND NATURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE OF THE HOUSE OF 2 REPRESENTATIVES, OR ANY SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES:3 (I) THE TOTAL NUMBER OF STREAM RESTORATION PROJECTS THAT4 HAVE BEEN REGISTERED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (9)(d)(I) OF THIS5 SECTION;6 (II) ANY COMPLAINT OF MATERIAL INJURY TO A VESTED WATER7 RIGHT MADE PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (9)(c)(I)(B) OF THIS SECTION; AND8 (III) THE RESULTS OF ANY STUDIES THAT THE STATE ENGINEER IS9 AWARE OF THAT **EVALUATE CHANGES TO HYDROLOGY OR WATER10** AVAILABLE TO VESTED WATER RIGHTS HOLDERS DUE TO STREAM11 RESTORATION PROJECTS IN THE STATE.12 (i) NOTWITHSTANDING ANY PROVISION IN THIS SUBSECTION (9) TO13 THE CONTRARY, NOTHING IN THIS SUBSECTION (9):14 (I) CREATES A BASIS FOR A WATER RIGHT, CREDIT, OR OTHER15 RIGHT FOR THE USE OF WATER;16 (II) CREATES PRECEDENT FOR THE LITIGATION OF, CREATES A17 LEGISLATIVE DETERMINATION OF, ALTERS, OR AFFECTS ANY REAL18 PROPERTY INTERESTS, INCLUDING EXPRESS OR PRESCRIPTIVE FLOWAGE19 EASEMENTS AFFECTING LAND ALONG A PUBLIC STREAM HELD BY ANY20 POLITICAL SUBDIVISION OR PERSON;21 (III) PROHIBITS THE STATE ENGINEER FROM TAKING ANY ACTION22 NECESSARY TO COMPLY WITH AN INTERSTATE COMPACT, INTERSTATE23 APPORTIONMENT DECREE, OR INTERSTATE AGREEMENT:24 (IV) ALTERS, AMENDS, OR AFFECTS ANY FEDERAL, STATE, OR25 LOCAL LAW OR REQUIREMENT THAT OTHERWISE APPLIES TO A STREAM26 RESTORATION PROJECT; OR27 (V) IMPAIRS OR IN ANY WAY AFFECTS THE ABILITY OF ANY PERSON1 TO APPROPRIATE WATER FOR PURPOSES RELATED TO A STREAM2 RESTORATION PROJECT.3 (j) A STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT THAT HAS OBTAINED ANY4 APPLICABLE PERMITS, IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION OR COMPLETED BY5 AUGUST 1, 2023, AND MEETS THE REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTION6 (9)(b)(IV) OF THIS SECTION DOES NOT CAUSE MATERIAL INJURY TO ANY7 VESTED WATER RIGHT AND IS NOT AN UNNECESSARY DAM OR OTHER8 OBSTRUCTION.9 SECTION 3. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds, 10 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate 11 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety.12
